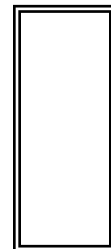

Describe Setting Large original land grant to John Kuykendall along the South Branch River. Lot 7 of the Fairfax South Branch River Survey, conveyed to Kuykendall by Thomas Lord Fairfax on June 15, 1749. Description of Building or Site (Original and Present) 2 Stories 5 Front Bays This building has evolved in four iterations, the first being the original fort, the second being a settler's cabin that was attached to the fort, an 1840 addition, and a 1987 kitchen addition. There are many outbuildings including an original slave dwelling. The original fort was a two story log house surrounded by a stockade and was centrally located on the broad bottom lands. It was built and used by the several Kuykendall families who settled there after 1749.

John Kuykendall House

John Kuykendall was the original grantee of this land, in 1749, from Lord Fairfax. During the French and Indian War in 1756, then Colonel George Washington ordered a detachment to John Kuykendall's. Washington referred to "Kuykendall's fort" in other war-time communications.

From existing evidence it cannot be said with certainty whether the present house is on the location of Fort Kuykendall. The fort may have been an adaptation of John Kuykendall's original home, and may make up part of what now stands.

The only complete log building is two stories high with logs carefully hewn to approximately 6" x 12" and joined with a complex, well-executed dovetail.* This section was remodeled and reroofed when the south wing was built, circa 1840.

Attached to the north end of the two-story log house are two one-story log buildings, neither of which has a south wall. Apparently these both were altered at time of connection, but a sequence is hard to establish.

The central log house is built over a partial basement and around a stone chimney, and would appear to be on its original site. While its corner joints are not visible, its original rafters are. They are hewn square, lapped and pinned at the ridge, and have crudely-joined horizontal binders.

The north-most log room appears to be only half of a house, possibly relocated. Its joists, half of them stubs, bear on a central log beam. It has no old rafters and its logs are concealed by modern siding.

The south wing, circa 1840, is a post-and-beam structure. Its walls are filled with mud and board ends.* Its interior is original and consists of two rooms and large hallway with staircase. The wood trim is Greek revival, closely related to that of Sycamore Dale-an 1839 house five miles to the North. The rafters in the Kuykendall south wing are peeled pine rounds, nailed to a ridge board.

This house has strong ties to the settlement and French and Indian War periods, but lacks solid evidence to identify and date its earliest part. If a restoration occurs, many questions could be answered.

The south wing is one of the latest of the post-and-beam structures in this survey. It is the site where, according to family history, escaped Confederate Lt. John Blue assumed another's identity when Union troops searched the house. .
